In his Dialogues, he tells us that he had Masses on thirty consecutive days offered for the repose of the soul of Justus, a monk who had died in the convent of St. Andrew in Rome. At the end of the thirtieth Mass, the deceased appeared to one of his fellow monks and announced that he had been delivered from the flames of Purgatory.

HOW SHOULD CHRISTIAN MEN AND WOMEN DRESS TODAY?

From our discussion of Paul, it becomes pretty clear what it means for us today. It means we should not cross dress. Men should dress and act like men, and women should dress and act like women and especially in worship, the minister should not look like a woman.

Aaron (of the Old Testament) wore a hat, but Paul forbids it in Corinth, for it is what women did, such was the style. Hence, to fully appreciate Paul here, we must distinguish critically about cultural norms. St. Paul is recognizing the new office of the priesthood, relative to that culture. Catholic Culture is not sovereign or untouchable: it partakes of the meanings of the era. We must be critical of our culture, and yet we cannot be a-cultural. We are always products of our culture, while as Catholics we must always be moral.

When Our Lady says immodest styles, she is reminding us that the moral law is to be followed, the Popes speak of too revealing forms of the human body. So women should dress respectfully and modestly in their society, but this doesn't come with a transcultural standard-such as her hair must be 15 inches long. In some cultures, the women have quite short hair. Many women can't grow long hair, especially when they get older.

Likewise with men, short hair is not always a sign of manhood. If you were an Assyrian, men wore hair down to their shoulders and a full beard, think of the Apostles. One decade, long hair is down to your ears; another, it is shameful to have a beard; and in another, it is fine to have facial hair.

With the summer, let us dress and carry ourselves as Temples of the Holy Ghost-- with modesty.
